of art comes in shades of white

Minimalist art makes a big statement at State of the Arts Gallery.

"White Hot" is the title and color of this art show. Obviously, the art here couldn't be all white, or it'd be invisible — as in the polar bear eating an ice cream cone in a snow storm. The exhibit's pieces are "white" in the sense that they're mainly monochromatic, with a few accents of color. There's plenty of white space. That restriction has an interesting ef-



fect. Subtracting most color out of the equation makes form, line and texture stand out. And the scant color there is

seems like a symphony in your eyes.
Paul Pisoni's art is an exploration of formal patterns and mathematical posrorman patterns and mantenated pos-sibilities. (If's what Einstein might come up with if he were locked in an attic with a high-tech Spirograph.) Pisoni's "The New Order" is a cluster of fibonanaci spirals wrapped around construction cranes. In the work of another artist, this cranes. In the work of another artist, this could either be a cheer for boosterism ("Yay development!") or an anti-growth rant ("Boo growth!") Pisoni seems only interested in the shape of change itself. He makes no judgements.

Bill Buchman's "Duality Dance" depicts

Bill Buchmans Duanty Dance depice a strong, highly stylized male figure kicking up his heels against a faint, swirly, abstract background. Buchman's energetic brushwork has the expressive confidence of Japan's Zen tradition.

Fred Nagel's white, marble sculptures don't need color. His "Seated Lady" is a gorgeous study in curves and intuitive geometry. His "Dakota" is a standing, robed
female figure — a Native American, with
echoes of the iconography of the Virgin
Mary. Nagel's sculpture is refined to the
Nth degree — but full of personality.

Pan Quiqun's sculpture is even more abstract than Nagel's. What interests him is form, not figure, and he's very good at capturing it. His "Marble' Sculpture VI" is an ovoid, marble donut, flecked with green veins like something organic. Qiqun haunts you with the collision of simplicity and complexity.

The three paintings of Thomas Lang's

"Triptich" crackle with a sharp, electric linework that captures what Lang's sharp eye sees. From left to right: A woman glances behind her at a flower; the same figure looks to her right; a girl plucks the flower. Lang pulls your eye from painting to painting with zigzag patterns of nega-tive space. Cartoonists use the same trick to make your eye skip from panel to pan-el. But it works for paintings too. Jason's "Peace Lily" has the look of a

Jasons 'Peace Lily nas the look of watercolor but it's actually a highly manipulated digital photograph printed on oversized rag paper. The burst of yellow in the center of the flower explodes like visual fireworks. Less is more fun.

David Steiner's paintings are bold in form but mysterious in meaning. His "Seated Figure" offers the barest hint of the figure in question. "Heaven on Earth" is a jumble of calligraphic elements — an undeciphered Rosetta Stone in a language yet to be translated.

This review doesn't exhaust the mystery of this exhibit, or begin to touch on the fine work by Dasha Reich, Gay Germain and others. See for yourself.
