

Buchman teaches an Expressive Figure Drawing class each week at the Arts Center. His students frequently hear this advice: "Drawing is not trimming the figure with lines; it's using lines to reveal and indicate form."

This summer, Buchman will be teaching classes and holding workshops around the country.

Buchman spent 20 years abroad, mostly in Paris and Copenhagen, Denmark, studying with renowned artists before moving to Sarasota seven years ago. His work is on exhibit in public and private galleries in Denmark, Sweden, England, and the United States.

sort's new Tennis Gardens facility. He also has degrees from the New England Conservatory of Music and has played with numerous has recorded several CDs.

ARTIST EXPERIENCES A CREATIVE BREAKTHROUGH
